Specific Things to Know Before Leaving the Dock

In light of all the boating accidents happening I thought it would be a good idea to go over a few things one should discuss with their passengers before leaving the dock.

According to Alan Sorum, harbormaster and safety trainer

in Alaska, it's definitely a good idea to do a safety briefing before anything happens--before anybody unties the boat, starts the engine, or leaves the harbor. On charter boats, it's a requirement that they do a short safety briefing before they even start a trip, but it doesn't have to be complicated. Nor, does it seem to happen, lately. You want to point out, for example,

- here's your life jacket;
- here's your exit;
- if there's an emergency, listen to the skipper and he'll tell you what to do;
- the radio's located here;
- this is how to turn the radio on;
- this is how you make a call; signaling;
- the flares are stowed under this bench
- the basics
- where things are on the boat and,
- what they should do if there's a problem.

It doesn't take a long time--a quick overview of the boat and where everything's at--but it's real useful.

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
